### Gas Fumes Killed Barber in a Hotel.

Investigations into the death of E. F. Seydler, the barber, who succumbed to gas fumes inhaled while spending Friday night at the Tremont Hotel, is being continued by Justice of the Peace J. H. Crooker. It is supposed that he retired for the night having inadvertently left the gas turned on.

Seydler went to the Tremont Hotel about 5 o'clock Friday afternoon. Shortly after, he was joined by two men and all three retired to a room. His companions remained with him for about an hour and then left.

A negro porter named Sam Kelley was the first one to discover the body. He went to arouse Seydler Saturday morning but his efforts were fruitless.

He was then attracted by the odor of escaping gas. Entrance to the room was effected through a window and the body found lying on the bed.

Seydler had a wife and two children living at 423 Woodland Avenue. The body was sent by the Westheimer Undertaking Establishment to Weimar, Texas, his former home, for burial.

### Colorado County Public Roads.

(From Sunday's Houston Post.)

Columbus, Texas, Oct. 18.—The only excuse The Post can give for laying out the route north from Houston for E. F. Ferguson in his coast to coast path-finder trip would be that the travel would be through a more populous section of the State. For expediency the route should be from Houston to Rosenberg, Eagle Lake, Columbus, Flatonia, Moulton, Gonzales, Seguin, San Antonio, Kerrville, Junction City, Fort Stockton to El Paso. In dry weather this route rarely furnishes occasion to change to second and the time is quickly coming when a trip can feasibly be made over it during rains. Between Houston and San Antonio on that route the only section that is not graded and bridged is ten miles between Rosenberg and East Bernard, in Fort Bend county. Fort Bend county has started the construction of that grade, to be filled with gravel.

Colorado County has made more improvement in its public roads during the past five years than in its previous history. The county has lately purchased six thousand dollars worth of new mules, in addition to several retained, three oil burning elevated traction graders, a number of new gravel wagons and an ample supply of gravel.

Each of the four commissioners has a gang in his precinct and the county convicts work where needed under the direction of the county farm superintendent, making five road gangs. Tax Assessor H. J. Laas, who reports gin statistics, now makes all of the twenty-nine gins in the county in an automobile in fair weather. Colorado county probably leads in the production of gravel for road work and construction purposes. There are four gravel companies that combined have a shipping capacity of something like 4800 cubic yards per month. The demand made upon them is greater than they can supply.

El Campo, Tex., Oct. 18.—A mission began here today in St. Philips Catholic Church and will continue through the week. It is being conducted by Rev. F. X. Lepsa, C. S. S. I. of Kansas City. All sermons will be preached in Bohemian language.
