

#### Rough Rice As Feed.

Beaumont, Texas, March 23.—In view of the fact that the 1913 rice crop, as a whole, has shown very poor milling quality, members of the Southern Rice Growers' Association have directed their attention to the feeding of ground rough rice to farm stock, and according to reports received by General Manager E. A. Eignus of the association, the farmers are meeting with great success.

Letters urging the members to feed their damaged rice to stock were written by General Manager Eignus and with each letter was sent a copy of the comparative analysis of ground rice, ear corn chops, ground oats, naturaline and alfalfa meal. The analysis was made by P. S. Tilson, a Houston chemist. The sample of rice was ground in an attrition mill and hulls were ground with it. The rice was higher in free nitrogen extracts, or carbo hydrates and lower in crude fibre than any others of the feeds examined. The percentage of protein exceeds the amount shown in ordinary corn chops. While rice is low in crude fats, this is overcome by the high percentage of carbo hydrates. Rice, ground in this manner, produces a well balanced ration for work animals and Mr. Eignus believes planters should be encouraged to feed this class of rice instead of buying high priced feed stuffs.

#### COMPARATIVE ANALYSIS GIVEN.

The comparative analysis furnished by Mr. Tilson follows:

Ground rice—crude protein, 8.64; crude fat, 1.75; crude fiber, 7.03; carbo hydrates, 63.93.

Ear corn chops—crude protein, 8.41; crude fat, 3.48; crude fiber, 7.28; carbo hydrates, 57.93.

Ground oats—crude protein, 10.72; crude fat, 3.83; crude fiber, 10.76; carbo hydrates, 58.35.

Naturaline—crude protein, 10.72; crude fat, 2.10; crude fiber, 9.91; carbo hydrates, 58.73.

Alfalfa meal—crude protein, 14.81; crude fat, 1.89; crude fiber, 27.65; carbo hydrates, 35.13.

Experiments with ground rough rice as a feed for stock are now being carried on at College Station for the Southern Rice Growers' Association and rice growers throughout the belt are awaiting with interest the result of these tests.

Reports are being received by Mr. Eignus continually from farmers throughout the rice belt, telling of their individual experiences and information received today from Fred D. Gibson of Stuttgart, Ark., a director of the association and an extensive rice planter and stockman, is of unusual interest.

Mr. Gibson has been experimenting for some time with ground rough rice as a feed for

hogs and he has found it very profitable. His method of feeding is based on 2 1-2 per cent feed to the live weight of the animal. For example, he feeds five pounds of ground rough rice a day to a hog weighing 200 pounds and he finds that for every five pounds fed two pounds of work are produced. The feed costs him a maximum of 1 1-2 cents per pound, so he figures that by feeding ground rice, he makes practically 100 per cent when hogs on the hoof are bringing a price of 7 cents per pound, the average price at the Fort Worth market.
