W. S. Griffiths and Ed. R. Frnka Elected School Trustees.

The election held in the Garwood school district Saturday, resulted as follows: W. S. Griffiths 78, Ed. R. Frnka 54, S. W. Martin 25 and G. A. Slawson 3, the two former named being elected trustees, Mr. Griffiths for two and Mr. Ed. R. Frnka for one year to fill the unexpired term of Mr. A. B. Minshall, resigned. Mr. W. H. Shaw, the present trustee who was elected last year with Mr. Minshall, remains for another year. There were 80 votes cast, out of which Mr. Griffiths lost only two. For county trustee at large Messrs C. K. Quin and Fritz Engelhard received one vote a piece. Messrs J. J. Pinchback, W. H. Shaw and W. S. Griffiths held the election.

A meeting of the local Farmers' Institute was held at the Garwood Hall Saturday afternoon, President Geo. N. Brown, presiding. Mr. O. G. Kolberg of Eagle Lake, government farm demonstration agent for Colorado county, was in attendance and addressed the meeting on farming, dairying and stock raising. He also had two packages of Sudan grass seed which he gave to Messrs F. C. Koons and C. L. Raver. There was only a small attendance and it is hoped that at the next meeting, which will be the first Saturday in May all the members will be present. Messrs Koons and Raver will conduct Sudan grass demonstrations for the U. S. Department of Agriculture under direction of Mr. Kolberg as demonstration agent.

Commissioners' Court Order.

It is ordered by the court that an election of the qualified property tax paying voters of Colorado county be held on Tuesday, May 12th, 1914, to determine whether or not an additional Road Tax shall be levied for the further maintenance of the Public Roads, said tax not to exceed five cents on the one hundred dollars valuation of taxable property of said county; and the County Judge is ordered to give notice of said election as provided by law. All voters favoring said tax shall have written or printed upon their ballots the words "For The Tax," and those opposing, the words "Against The Tax."
