First 1914 Bale of Cotton in U. S. Raised at Lyford.

Brownsville, Texas, July 3.—The first bale of cotton grown in the United States in 1914 was shipped out of Lyford, Cameron county, at 5 o'clock this morning and will give that community the honor of having put the first bale on the market for the second time in succession. The cotton was shipped by R. H. Deyo & Son, and was consigned to the Houston Cotton Exchange, where it will be sold. The bale was ginned last night, and weighed 405 pounds. The baling was completed just as the train whistled for the station. Eighty five pounds of seed cotton was left on hand because of lack of time to catch the train.

The first bale last year was shipped from Lyford on July 10, making this year's bale one week earlier.

The first bale of 1914 Texas crop of cotton has been received by W. D. Cleveland & Sons, reaching Houston at 7 p. m. Friday, and will have a prominent place in the big parade Fourth of July. The bale was raised at Lyford, Cameron county, and shipped by the Lyford commercial club, members of which accompanied the bale to Houston. It weighs 405 pounds and is a week earlier than the first bale of the 1913 crop. The bale last year was also shipped to W. D. Cleveland & Sons, from Lyford by R. H. Deyo & Son, and reached Houston July 10. Following the parade the bale will be auctioned off at the Cotton Exchange at 11 o'clock in the morning and the purchaser will forward it to New York by express.

Following the sale of the bale W. D. Cleveland & Sons will entertain the Cotton Exchange members with cigars and punch, as has been their custom for years.

The bale was decorated with pennants of the Lyford Commercial Club, which shipped the bale to Houston Friday. It weighed 392 pounds and was classed strict low middling and was bought by W. D. Cleveland & Sons for \$500, making the price a little over \$1.27 per pound.

This bale was a week earlier than last year, the first bale at that time arriving July 10 and came from the same town, as did also the 1912 bale, and also purchased by W. D. Cleveland & Sons.
